

REQUEST FOR QUALIFICATIONS AND PROPOSALS FOR PLANNING CORRIDOR STUDY AND DESIGN PLAN

US HIGHWAY 76 (EAST PALMETTO STREET)

RFQ# 26-15/16

SUBMISSION DEADLINE: THURSDAY, MARCH 10, 2016 AT 3:00 P.M.

Florence County, South Carolina, USA, is seeking to hire a planning design firm to prepare a corridor overlay study and design plan of the US Highway 76 corridor to ensure that the future development of the above referenced corridor is done in a way that will enhance the area and its opportunities to attract a higher quality of development as envisioned by the community. The proposed Corridor Study and Plan will be a blueprint of design standards and guidelines for handling the growth in this area.

The US Highway 76 corridor (East Palmetto Street) provides a four lane access from the City of Florence downtown to a major university, Francis Marion University. It also provides access to the Florence Regional Airport, Interstate 95 and is a priority transportation corridor for coastal traffic. In addition, it should be noted that this corridor is a **USDOT Identified Primary Freight Network**. The resulting plan will consist of a review of the surrounding area of US Highway 76 from the City limits of eastern Florence (Church Street) to Francis Marion University along US Highway 76 for a potential of twenty (20) years of growth and development.

The plan should address both immediate problems and long term scenarios detailing zoning and future land use. Florence County is seeking firms who have long term experience in design planning as well as experience dealing with the SCDOT and sensitivity to local political and land use issues. The purpose of this RFQ is to assess the professional qualifications of the firm, its understanding and awareness of the regions' overall goals, and its ability to complete the project in a timely matter.

The preparation of this plan will allow for collaborative involvement of local stakeholders, including local residents, neighborhood associations, governmental entities, members of the business and industrial community, freight and transportation providers, and the Transportation Planning and Engineering Design Consultant for Florence County RFQ# 25-15/16 who should all be involved in a meaningful and productive manner throughout the preparation of this plan. All required federal and state guidelines applicable to an effort of this nature will be followed. The consultant will provide research, planning and design services sufficient to accomplish the goals of this project. In addition, the consultant shall be required to ensure that the public is properly notified regarding the proposed study and given the opportunity to provide input throughout the planning process. The consultant will coordinate activities with the Planning Director, Florence County Planning Department.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

Florence County requests the qualifications of consulting firms or teams of firms to develop a planning corridor study and design plan for the US Highway 76, East Palmetto Street corridor. A map illustrating this corridor is attached herein.

In general, the scope of services for the study and plan will consist of a review of the surrounding area along US Highway 76 from the City limits of eastern Florence (Church Street) to Francis Marion University for a potential of twenty (20) years of growth and development. The resulting plan will help guide decision making related to the future development of properties within the study area. The intent is to ensure that future development occurs in a manner that is complementary of the County's development principles and to promote quality growth that supports a sustainable future for the County. This plan would incorporate and expand upon general policy recommendations of the County's Comprehensive Land Use Plan.

The consulting firm will review the existing land use features, zoning and future land use to determine future infrastructure needs for the area and prepare parcel summary of available developable properties. The consultant will develop a conceptual plan, as well as provide anticipated costs to implement the plan. The

consultant will also provide a future development scenario for the area based on Florence County's future land use map and current zoning map, along with conclusions and recommendations in an easy to read, uniform Master Plan document of the US Highway 76 corridor.

The resulting plan is intended to provide guidance and criteria for the planning, design and implementation of public and private improvements. If properly administered and adhered to, they should result in public and private development improvements that achieve, as a minimum, a common level of quality in terms of site design, architectural design, landscaping, and other site improvements.

The general purposes of the Design Standards and Guidelines are:

- To establish a practical, interconnected system of streets, parks, and parkways that allows easy orientation and convenient access for all modes of appropriate transportation.
- To utilize natural open spaces, such as creeks, and developed public spaces, streets, parks and parkways, to organize and coordinate development.
- To accommodate a broad mix of development types that encourages alternative transportation, especially walking, and transit use.
- To provide common usable open space that is of mutual benefit to surrounding property owners, businesses, and residents.
- To construct the early phases of development in a manner that establishes a pattern and character for the long-term evolution of the corridor.

The Design Standards and Guidelines should address in detail the recommended design configurations for each of the following streetscape design elements:

Traffic • Planting and Irrigation • Bus Stops • Sidewalks and Corner treatments • Site Furnishings • Lighting • ArtWork • Entrance Gateways • Utilities and Drainage

These Standards and Guidelines supplement other development regulations such as the Florence County Zoning Ordinance (adopted in 1994), which includes detailed criteria by zone district, planned development regulations, design and improvement standards, supplemental use regulations and sign regulations.

SCOPE OF SERVICES

The consulting firm or team shall provide the full range of planning / engineering services necessary for developing the Corridor Design Standards and Guidelines Plan along the detail level of a small area plan. Services include compilation of GIS and other base data for mapping and plan graphics; meetings with project representatives, stakeholders, property owners, the Transportation Planning and Engineering Design Consultant for Florence County RFQ# 25-15/16 and others involved in the planning process; scenario planning capabilities, facilitation of charrettes to generate preferred land use scenarios and alternatives; and finalization of the Plan including maps, graphics and documents based upon collective input generated through the charrette process. The Plan should account for the development potential of the next twenty (20) years. The planning process is expected to include public outreach (charrette), stakeholder involvement, market analysis, land use scenario planning, design, infrastructure and implementation recommendations. Specifically, Florence County is seeking at minimum the following services:

• Study Design and Administration

The consultant shall work with Florence County officials to develop a project schedule and to determine the desired features of the analysis and the required deliverables. The consultant will provide written and oral communications, as requested by Florence County and others, deemed necessary to communicate the findings of the study. Appropriate public involvement will be incorporated into all phases of the project.

• Mapping

Mapping for the project will be produced in cooperation with Florence County using existing data prepared and provided by Florence County. Mapping will include wetlands/waterbodies; roads, infrastructure, USGS/aerial topography; property boundary, etc.

• Market Study

Conduct a market study to document demand and identify land development opportunities.

• Scenario Planning

Evaluate potential land use strategies sufficient to quantify alternative land-use scenarios.

• Land Use Scenario Plan

The appearance of the preferred land use scenario along the corridor within the study area.

• Development Strategy

Identification of a preferred development strategy for undeveloped properties within the study area.

• Public Service Needs

Quantify impacts and provide cost estimates for public service needs associated with future development including water, sewer, transportation, schools, public services, etc.

• Denote Guidelines

General guidelines and comprehensive plan for streetscapes and open space.

• Facilitate Charrette

Host a multi-day planning and design workshop (charrette) for key stakeholder groups, key land owners, staff, Florence County Chamber of Commerce, elected officials and other local organizations.

• Conduct Meetings with Local Regulatory and Utility Providers

The consultant will schedule to meet with all applicable regulatory agencies and utility providers and provide meeting summaries during the process of developing this plan to insure all potential issues are addressed appropriately.

• Design Concepts and Cost Estimates

The consultant will develop a document and present its findings in a visual comprehensive format showing the conceptual designs, rough cost estimates and impact analyses for each alternative for distribution to the public and presentation to the Florence County officials. The presentation must be clear and easy to understand by lay persons. Goals should be identified for short range (2-5 years), mid-range (5-10 years) and long range (10-20 years) development strategies.

• Identification of Funding Options

- The consultant will state all current method/sources of funding. The consultant will project these funds to long range development strategies by year.
- The consultant will review how other areas, within South Carolina and the United States, have funded corridor enhancement improvements by innovative means. The consultant will identify potential funding sources and potential revenues from each source.

• Completion of Corridor Study and Design Plan

• The successful consultant shall complete and submit to the Count the Corridor Study and Design Plan no later than 1 year following the issuance of the Notice to Proceed Letter issued by the County.

NOTE: The study is to include a menu for projects based on TDM strategies as part of the delivered corridor plan. These should each have a logical terminus, independent utility, and a planning level cost estimate and scope.

- Note that the entire corridor portion identified in this RFQ is Identified within the <u>SC Freight Plan (2014)</u> as part of the SC-identified freight and strategic highway networks
- Note that SC 327 (N. Williston Road), which intersects US76 and continues to I-95 is identified by the USDOT as a Multimodal Freight Network Route in its draft document. As it acts as a "connector" (not USDOT identified connector) between 76 and 95 (I95 is a <u>USDOT identified Primary Freight Network</u> from SC327 to NC/SC state line), the potential for increased freight AADTT should be considered during this review
- A portion of the identified corridor is currently in the SCDOT STIP Florence County Page 1
 - a. Florence County Pavement Resurfacing:
 - i. US 76 (0.10 mi. W of SC 327 (N. Williston Rd.) to S-24 (Old Marion Highway))
 - ii. US 76 (US 301 (Freedom Bvld) to 0.22 Mi E of US 301)
 - iii. US 76 (0.22 Mi E of US 301 to 0.10 Mi W of SC 327)

INFORMATION REQUESTED

Florence County intends to make its selection from among eligible firms that submit requested qualifications in this package. Firms wishing to be considered must also submit a brief letter of interest, not to exceed five (5) typewritten pages, describing why the firm is particularly well qualified to perform this service. The letter of interest and the response to the information requested shall comprise the qualifications package. Six (6) copies of the package shall be submitted. Special binders and covers are not encouraged, and are typically discarded prior to review of the package. The following information shall be included at a minimum on the Standard Form 330.

1. Name, address, phone number, e-mail, fax number, type of ownership, number of years in business and principals, including names, titles, education, experience and technical competence, as evidenced by resumes and experience records.

*Type of Entity *Brief History *Location *Number of Employees *Area of Expertise *Staff Members anticipated to actively work on this project

- 2. Resumes of individuals who will be assigned to provide this service to Florence County. At a minimum, provide name, title, project assignment, education, current license(s) and any other experience and qualifications relevant to this project assignment. Individual(s) should have, as a minimum, experience with design and construction of five (5) relevant projects within the last ten (10) years. Failure to comply with this section can result in a response being designated noncompliant.
- 3. A strong project manager with extensive planning experience and ability to synthesize the various elements of the Plan is required. Demonstrated experience managing complex projects subject to political forces and experience in public and stakeholder involvement will be important. The project manager must be highly skilled at managing projects to ensure that they are delivered within scope, according to schedule, and within budget. The proposal should also discuss how the project manager would ensure a high quality of work, preferably through a formal quality assurance plan and process.
- 4. The consultant must demonstrate qualifications in the areas of land use analysis and planning including road design, environmental screening, public involvement and cost estimation.

The staff assigned to the project must have extensive experience in urban design planning. The proposal should give specifics of the experience of the staff assigned to the project, including level of involvement in previous projects and names of contact persons for similar projects.

The contract for the Scope of Work will be based on a fee schedule with a not-to-exceed amount. Costs will be negotiated with the selected firm.

- 5. The firm's capabilities, specialized experience, and technical competence in development of design requirements, designs, and construction of similar projects. Provide previous similar project descriptions performed demonstrating the experience and level of expertise applicable to this project. Provide project name and location, project description, date of services and services provided.
- 6. Identify the overall approach and technical objectives guiding this Plan effort. The approach stated in the Request for Qualifications should reflect the proposing consultant's intent, creativity, and understanding of the objectives. The objectives should identify clearly and concisely the products of the Plan and convey a full understanding of the County's vision and expected outcomes.
- 7. Scope of Services should provide the consultant's approach and methodology to execute the work program. The proposal may be creative and suggest alteration to or enhancement of the work program and Plan deliverables.
- 8. The firm will provide a current workload, including a list of current projects, identified by name and size and anticipated completion date.
- 9. Provide references of clients where similar design services were provided in the past ten (10) years relative to the project described herein including contact name, job title, and telephone number, start and completion dates, sample programming documents, and final project report.

- 10. Knowledge of Florence County area and pertinent construction materials, vendor facilities, and standard practices.
- 11. Has respondent been a part of any litigation in last 3 years? If so, please include the style, case number and a brief description of the nature of the claim for each case.
- 12. Has respondent ever failed to complete an engagement for design services or defaulted on a contract to provide design services? If so, please describe the circumstances.
- 13. Other experience and qualifications relevant to design services required for this project.
- 14. Signed statement attesting that qualifications submitted are statements of fact including name, title, signature and date.
- 15. If respondent intends to partner with another firm, clearly outline the division of responsibilities. Identify members of the primary firm, the affiliated firm (if applicable), and any sub-consultants (if applicable).

SELECTION

Florence County staff will select the approved firm for the work outlined in this document by means of a twophase procurement selection process. The process involves first the solicitation of Statements of Qualification from interested candidates which will be evaluated to identify those which, in the determination of the Selection Committee, best meet the established qualification requirements or could, after clarification be made acceptable.

PHASE 1 – Initial Evaluation:

The following is a list of the criteria that will be used in evaluating qualifications. Respondents will be evaluated on Statement of Qualifications submitted. The Selection Committee will review each submittal and select a shortlist of no more than four (4) of the most qualified respondents based on the initial evaluation criteria stated below. The County has the right, however, to determine less than four (4) shortlisted firms. The shortlisted firms may then be asked to interview with the Selection Committee.

PHASE 2 - Interview Procedure:

Once a shortlist has been determined, the shortlisted respondents may be asked to come in for an interview with the Selection Committee. The top ranked respondents will be required to make an oral presentation of their qualifications. This opportunity allows respondents to further define the primary features and benefits of their qualifications, to allow for qualification clarifications, and to allow questions from the selection committee. Presentation format is left to the discretion of the respondent. A presentation room will be available; however, respondent must submit a list of any equipment needed for their presentation, if any. Presentations will be limited to a one hour period which includes questions and answers.

The candidates may be asked to provide more detailed information about technical expertise, past experience, LEED qualifications, minority business utilization as well as other issues. Short-listed firms will also be given the opportunity to tour the project site. The Selection Committee reserves the right to reject any and all submissions and to waive technicalities and informalities.

The interviews of the short-listed respondents will be evaluated on the following basis.

The Selection Committee of Florence County staff will review and rank each proposal. This Selection Committee will evaluate the interviews and rank the short listed respondents in accordance with the final evaluation criteria results. A report will be issued to the FLATS Policy Committee and County Council that recommends that a contract and delivery method be negotiated with the top ranked firm. The form of contract used will be approved by the Florence County Procurement Office.

Negotiation will be initiated with the top ranked evaluated firm. If an agreement cannot be made with the top ranking firm, negotiations with the top ranking form will be formally terminated and negotiations will be started with the next highest ranking firm.

The funding for this project will be supplied by Florence County, the City of Florence and major stakeholders along the US Highway 76 corridor. Accordingly, the selected consultant will be required to comply with all applicable Federal regulations and contracting provisions required by the federal funding authority, including 49 CFR, Part 31 – Allowable Costs, Civil Rights, Minority Business Enterprise and other applicable assurance provisions. Additionally, the contract must be in compliance with state and local requirements applicable to such contracts.

Florence County reserves the right to accept or reject any or all Statements of Qualifications in whole or in part and to amend or supplement this RFQ. Florence County is under no obligation to use a firm for a particular project in the future and may select other firm(s) to do future work.

NOTE: By submission of your letter of interest and qualification statements in response to this solicitation, you are certifying that neither your firm nor any of its principals are presently debarred, suspended, proposed for

debarment, declared ineligible, or excluded from participation in this procurement process by any governmental department or agency. Further, if such a department or suspension occurs during the course of the procurement, you shall so inform Florence County.

Note: No proposer shall, directly or indirectly, engage in any conduct (other than submission of a proposal or other prescribed submissions and/or presentations before the Evaluation or Selection Committees) to influence any employee or elected official of Florence County concerning award of a contract as a result of this solicitation. Violation of this prohibition may result in disqualification of the proposer from further participation in the solicitation for services or goods sought herein, or from participation in future Florence County solicitations or contracts.

PROFESSIONAL INSURANCE REQUIREMENTS AND INDEMNIFICATION

The successful firm(s) shall procure and maintain insurance for protection from claims under workers' compensations acts; claims for damages because of bodily injury including personal injury, sickness or disease, or death of any and all employees or of any person other than such employees; claims for damages because of injury to or destruction of property, including loss of use resulting therefrom; claims caused by professional errors, acts, or omission; and any other insurance prescribed by law. The successful firm shall name Florence County, South Carolina, its elected and appointed officials, officers, and employees "Additional Insured" as their interests may appear but only with respect to services performed or provided by successful firm on behalf of the County under Consultant's commercial general liability insurance policy. The successful firm shall, within 10 calendar days of the full execution of any contract resulting from this RFQ, provide the County's Procurement Officer with a certificate(s) of insurance evidencing the coverage required above and containing an endorsement to the effect that any cancellation or non-renewal shall not be until 10 calendar days after the insurer or the selected firm gives written notice to the County.

Without limiting the provisions of paragraph above, the selected firm shall during the term of any contract resulting from this purchase and maintain insurance with limits not less than those set forth below:

The successful firm(s) shall take out and maintain, during the life of the contract agreement, workers' compensation and employer's liability insurance for all employees to be engaged in services on this project under this agreement in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00, and in case any such services are sublet, the firm(s) shall require all subcontractor(s) also to provide workers' compensation and employer's liability insurance in an amount not less than \$1,000,000.00 for all of the subcontractor's employees to be engaged in such.

Employer's Liability Insurance - \$1,000,000 each accident, \$1,000,000 disease policy limit, \$1,000,000 disease each employee

Commercial General Liability Insurance - \$1,000,000 per occurrence (bodily injury and property damage) / \$1,000,000 general aggregate

Automobile Liability Insurance - \$1,000,000 combined single limit (bodily injury and property damage), each accident

Professional Liability Insurance - \$1,000,000 per claim / \$1,000,000 general aggregate

Professional Services: The selected firm(s) shall indemnify and hold Florence County, South Carolina, its elected and appointed officials, officers, and employees, harmless from and against judgments, liabilities, damages, losses, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs but only to the extent otherwise authorized by law) to the extent caused by any negligent act, error, or omission in the performance and furnishing of the selected firm's professional services under any contract resulting from this RFQ, including any negligent act, error or omission of any individual or entity directly or indirectly employed by the selected firm(s) to perform any of the work or anyone for whose acts, errors, or omissions the selected firm(s) may be liable, regardless of whether or not caused in part by a party indemnified hereunder.

Other Than Professional Services: With respect to all acts or omissions of the selected firm(s), or any individual or entity directly or indirectly employed by the selected firm(s) to perform any of the work or anyone for whose acts, errors, or omissions the selected firm(s) may be liable, which do not arise out of or result from the performance of professional services, and which may be covered by employer's liability insurance, commercial general liability insurance, automobile liability insurance, or other general liability insurance, the selected firm(s) shall indemnify and hold the Florence County, South Carolina, its elected and appointed officials, officers, and employees, harmless from and against judgments, liabilities, damages, losses, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees and costs but only to the extent otherwise authorized by law) to the extent caused by or arising out of the selected firm's negligent acts of commission or omission (or those of or any individual or entity directly or indirectly employed by the selected firm to perform any of the work or anyone for whose actions or failure to act the selected firm may be liable) during the performance of this Agreement.

The selected firm shall require any subconsultants (if any) to purchase and maintain insurance with limits not less than those required above to be purchased and maintained by the selected firm. In addition, the selected firm shall require any subconsultants (if any) to assume the selected firm's indemnification obligations under any contract resulting from this RFQ to the extent they relate to the subconsultant's obligations under any contract with the selected firm.

QUALIFICATIONS SUBMITTAL PROCEDURES

- 1. There will be no pre-statement of qualification meeting. However, all questions submitted and their answers will be promptly emailed to all firms submitting a question. All questions regarding this RFQ shall be submitted by email to pfletcher@florenceco.org no later than 5:00 PM on February 26, 2016.
- 2. Six (6) copies of the qualification statement must be delivered to the County by Thursday, March 10, 2016 at 3:00 p.m. The qualification statement may be:

Offerors mailing a qualification statement should allow sufficient mailing time to ensure timely receipt. The County is not responsible for qualification statements delayed by mail and/or delivery services of any nature. Qualification statements received after the set time for closing will be returned unopened.

3. Qualification statements must be made in the official name of the firm or the individual under

which business is conducted (showing the official business address) and must be signed in ink by a person duly authorized to legally bind the person, partnership, company or corporation submitting the qualification statement. Qualification statements must be valid for a minimum of ninety (90) days.

- 4. Qualification statements may be withdrawn by offeror prior to, but not after, the time set for the opening.
- 5. Upon receipt by the County, the qualification statement shall become the property of the County, without compensation to the offeror, for disposition or usage by the County at its discretion. The County shall have the sole discretion in evaluating both the qualification statement and the qualifications of the offerors. The County reserves the right to reject any and all qualification statements and is not bound to accept any qualification statements, if the qualification statement acceptance is contrary to the best interest of the County. The particulars of any qualification statement will remain confidential until a contract is signed with the successful offeror(s).
